THOMAS H. KEAN

Thomas H. Kean served as governor of the State of New Jersey from 1982 to 1990, and president of Drew University from 1990 to 2005. In the aftermath of the 9/11 attacks on the World Trade Center and the Pentagon, President George W. Bush appointed Governor Kean as chair of the National Commission on Terrorist Attacks Upon the United States, which he headed from 2002 to 2004. As governor, Kean was rated among America's most effective state leaders by Newsweek magazine. He was noted for tax cuts that spurred substantial job growth in the state; a federally replicated welfare reform program; landmark environmental policies; and more than 30 education reforms.

ARTHUR J. HOLLAND PROGRAM ON ETHICS IN GOVERNMENT

The Arthur J. Holland Program on Ethics in Government was established in 1989 by Edward J. Bloustein, then president of Rutgers, to honor the distinguished alumnus and long-time mayor of Trenton, the capital of New Jersey. Mayor Holland was a proponent and practitioner of open, responsive, and ethical government. The Holland Ethics Symposium Lecture focuses on the ethical issues that arise in the context of administering state and local government.
