Admiral Loy will address these and other issues affecting the current state of security preparedness in New Jersey. Culminating a 45-year career in public service, Admiral Loy recently retired as the U.S. Department of Homeland Security's first deputy secretary. As deputy secretary, Admiral Loy was closely involved in the consolidation of 22 separate federal agencies into a new, unified Cabinet department. Previously, Admiral Loy served as commandant of the U.S. Coast Guard. He now serves as Senior Counselor at The Cohen Group in Washington, D.C.
